Report on Admissions--Council of Deans

The Council of Deans adopted the following report of its Committee on Admissions and dissolved the Committee:

1. No action be taken with respect to any admissions procedures except freshman admissions for the fall of 1961, pending action by the Faculty Senate's Committee on Admissions.
2. Admission of freshmen for the fall of 1961 be handled on the following basis:
 - a. Students having a "B" or better high-school average to be admitted as they apply, prior to receipt of 12-grade test scores.
 - b. Out-of-state students to be admitted only if they stand in the upper 40% of their high school graduating class.
 - c. After receipt of 12-grade test scores, students to be admitted only if they have both a "C" or better high school average and a score of 200 or better on the test.
 - d. Acceptance of all freshmen to be terminated after admission of 1,475 males and 1,425 females, on the basis of lack of facilities.

FACULTY SENATE MINUTES

I. Regular Session April 19, 1961

The Faculty Senate met in regular session in the Library Lecture Hall at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 15, 1961. President Blackwell presided.

II. Report of Steering Committee

Dr. Lewis Killian, Chairman of the Steering Committee announced that Dr. Francis Townsend and Dr. W. F. Jordan, of the Committee on Academic Affairs, will serve as the Committee on Examinations this semester. He said that there would be one item of new business which was not included on the published agenda.

III. Election of the Steering Committee

Dr. Lewis Killian said in regard to the election of a Steering Committee this year:

1. The Bylaws of the Faculty Senate, Section E. Items a and b state: "a. A Steering Committee shall consist of seven persons elected for staggered two-year terms, from the voting membership of the Faculty Senate. b. In the initial election to be held in May 1959 four members shall be elected for one year and three members for two years. In succeeding elections four members shall be elected for two-year terms in the even years and three members for two-year terms in the odd years."

2. Last year, May 1960, four members were elected to the Steering Committee for a two-year term.

3. Last year the Steering Committee decided not to restrict people's eligibility. If a person has one year in Senate, he is to be eligible for election to the Steering Committee for a two-year term.

4. Two of the four persons elected to the Steering Committee last year whose term should expire in 1963 have not been re-elected to Faculty Senate. One other person (of the four elected last year) will be on a two-year leave of absence.

5. Therefore, six persons must be elected to the Steering Committee this year. The three that would be elected normally and the three elected last year who cannot serve next year.

Dr. Killian suggested that six new members be elected this year; that the three persons with the most votes be designated as two-year members and the three with the least number of votes be designated one-year members of the Steering Committee.

Dr. Phifer so moved. The motion was seconded and passed.

IV. Report on Admissions

Dean Baum made the following report:

The Council of Deans adopted the following report of its Committee on Admissions and dissolved the Committee:

1. No action be taken with respect to any admissions procedures except freshman admissions for the fall of 1961, pending action by the Faculty Senate's Committee on Admissions.
2. Admissions of freshmen for the fall of 1961 be handled on the following basis:
 - a. Students having a "B" or better high-school average to be admitted as they apply, prior to receipt of 12-grade test scores.
 - b. Out-of-state students to be admitted only if they stand in the upper 40% of their high school graduating class.
 - c. After receipt of 12-grade test scores, students to be admitted only if they have both a "C" or better high school average and a score of 200 or better on the test.
 - d. Acceptance of all freshmen to be terminated after admission of 1,475 males and 1,425 females, on the basis of lack of facilities.

Dean Baum said that Item d under Number 2 should be clarified. The report indicates that a total of 2,900 students are to be admitted. This does not mean that 2,900 freshmen will appear or that there is room for this many freshmen. It means that of the 2,900 students accepted for admission, approximately 2,100 will register at FSU next September.

V. Announcements

1. Dr. Beck, Chairman of Elections Committee, announced that the results of the election of the Faculty Professional Relations Committee will be appended to the minutes of this meeting.
2. President Blackwell gave a progress report on the legislation being considered that is of interest to the faculty of The Florida State University including the status of the budget.

New Courses

Geology 555-B Model Theory (1)

Prerequisite: Gly 355, 401 and 435; Ms 206; 1 year of college physics. Dimensional analysis, physical similarity, rheological models; design and operation of models.

Sociology 530 Conceptual Frameworks of Family Theorists (3)

An examination of the general frames of references of sociology, social psychology and social anthropology with respect to family behavior with attention to the specific conceptual schemes of several major theorists.

Engineering Science 511-512 Analysis of Linear and Nonlinear (3-3)

Prerequisite: EgS 211-212 and Ms 416. Analysis of electrical, mechanical, acoustic and fluid systems with linear and nonlinear components. Transient and steady-state analysis. Analog computers.

Engineering Science 521-522 Solid State Devices and Circuits (3-3)

Prerequisite: EgS 305. Corequisite: Ps 561 (with EgS521). Technology of semi-conductor materials and transistors, magnetic and dielectric amplifiers. Linear and nonlinear analysis of amplifier configurations, oscillators, and pulse circuits.

Engineering Science 523-524 Microwave Electronics (3-3)

Prerequisite: a first course in electromagnetic theory. Communications and measuring techniques at microwave frequencies, including the technology of microwave devices, and the analysis of fields and circuits.

Engineering Science 531-532 Analysis of Elastic and Plastic (3-3)

Prerequisites: EgS 311 and Ms 426. Stresses and displacements in solid bodies due to static, dynamic, and thermal disturbances. One, two, and three dimensional problems in elasticity and plasticity.

Engineering Science 541-542 Materials (3-3)

Prerequisite: EgS 412. Corequisite: Ps. 561. Structure of solids, relationships between structure and properties, and the control of structure. Metals and nonmetals will be discussed.
