**A Journey in Time: France in the Early Fifteenth Century.** Lecture illustrated by the calendar miniatures from **The Very Rich Book of Hours** of the Duc de Berry. By Dr. Wilson Micks, Professor of French.

**Panama—Crossroads of the World.** Illustrated lecture by Dr. Margaret V. Campbell, Associate Professor of Modern Languages. Dr. Campbell lived for many years in the Panama Canal Zone.
