n Congressman Hits ic; Till Case Verdict At Detroit Rally

DETROIT, Sept. 25 — (AP) — A self-styled "black Congressman" told a Negro rally here Sunday he was glad to return from the "jungles of Mississippi and its daily reign of terror."

The rally was called in protest against the verdict acquitting two white Mississippians in the slaying trial of a 14-year-old Chicago Negro.

"I have never witnessed such perjury and fantastic twisting of facts," Representative Charles C. Diggs (D-Mich.) said upon his return from the trial at Sumner, Miss. He told a crowd estimated at 5,000 milling but orderly Negroes about the "savages who murdered young Emmett Till," for whistling a "wolf call" at the wife of one of the defendants.

"The lone antiseptic which helped clean the bad taste of the verdict from my mouth," Diggs said, "was the fairness of Judge Curtis M. Swango."

The huge meeting was called by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. It overflowed from one church to another nearby.

Diggs, of Detroit, said he intends to seek a conference with President Eisenhower at the first "practical" opportunity concerning "the Mississippi situation."

Kidnap Hearing Set for Friday

GREENWOOD, MISS., Sept. 25 — (AP) — District Attorney Stanny Saunders Sunday said a preliminary hearing will be held Friday, perhaps earlier, for two half brothers charged with kidnaping Emmett Till.

Roy Bryant, 25, of Money, and J. W. Milam, 36, of Glendora, have been in jail since they were arrested August 29.

A jury in adjoining Tallahatchie County acquitted the brothers on the murder charge Friday. The kidnap charge was filed in Leflore County.

County Judge Charles Pollard said a hearing on the kidnaping charge may be held earlier than Friday if records of the Sumner trial arrive. Bond is expected to be set at the hearing.
