

MAN KILLED BY A LEOPARD.—Last night an inquest was held at the London Hospital, on the body of Henry Haynes, who came by his death from the bite on the knee of one of the leopards at St. James' Theatre, inflicted about three weeks ago. The wound assumed no appearance at first of an alarming nature; but it having subsequently manifested dangerous symptoms, it was recommended by Mr. Dyer, the surgeon of Blackwall, who attended deceased, that he should be removed to the London Hospital. This was complied with, but not until some delay had taken place, owing to the scruples of his friends. It was also some time before they would consent to the amputation of the injured limb; and when they at length did so, it unfortunately proved too late. The leg was removed, but the veins "stuffed," and ultimately broke out, although amputation was performed in a very skilful manner by Mr. Andrews, of the London Hospital. The inquest was adjourned to procure the evidence of the parties who witnessed the accident at the theatre. Deceased was in the employ of Mr. Wombwell, to whom the leopard belongs.
